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Some Remarks on Norwegian Prosody

The author is chiefly concerned with Standard Eastern

Norwegian and will deal with the stress system, the toneme
system and the length system. All three systems involve a
binary opposition. An utterance falls into a number of
syllables. These syllables are either stressed or unstressed.

The stress system is basic and includes all syllables. It is
found in all Norwegian dialects. The toneme system is lacking
in some Northern and Western dialects. In the tonemic dialects
the toneme system is superimposed on the stress system, but
it does not include all syllables. Toneme presupposes stress,
not vice versa. Tonemic opposition can only occur between
sequences of one stressed syllable + one or more unstressed
syllables. Auditory observation as well as fundamental
frequency curves disprove the old view that isolated stressed
monosyllables have the same tonetic realization as toneme 1.

It seems realistic to work with long and short vowel phonemes, but not long and short consonant phonemes. Contoid length can be varied freely without changing a word into another, while this is impossible with vocoid length.
